Hazard Summary

Fall from Truck

A worker fell from the top of a truck tank and was fatally injured.

The worker was not using any fall protection and fell over 3 metres from the top of the truck as he was accessing the hatch to fill the tank. The worker sustained a head injury and was taken to the health center where he died as a result of the injury.

Safe Work Practices

Fall Protection

All workers in the Northwest Territories and Nunavut who work at heights of 3 metres or more, without standard quardrails, must wear CSA approved fall protection equipment. This includes the top of trucks where the height is over 3 metres. A means of protecting the worker from a fall must also be in place if the height is under 3 metres and there is a risk of injury.

You can prevent falls by:

- Planning and implementing a fall protection plan;
- Ensuring workers receive proper training on the use of all PPE.

Safety Act and Regulations

NWT and Nunavut Occupational Health & Safety Regulations **Section 119.(1):** An employer shall ensure that workers use a fall protection

system at a work site if (a) a worker could fall 3 m or more; or (b) there is a risk of injury if a worker falls less than 3 m.

NWT and Nunavut Mine Regulations.

Section 8.11. (1) Subject to subsection (5), where a person is exposed to the hazard of falling more than 3 m, a fall arresting device shall be provided to the person and he or she shall use the device.
